The Overseas Missions Department has had an incredible and busy year, and we are excited for what 2024 holds as we partner with the Lord in spreading the whole gospel to the whole world.

In 2023, we've continued to focus on Timor-Leste and have sent several missions teams to Indonesia. Additionally, we continue to support missions work in various areas such as the Middle East, Lebanon, Papua New Guinea, Kiribati, South Africa, Sri Lanka, and Botswana. I want to express special gratitude to all the churches that generously contributed to the offering for the purchase of land and building in Kiribati. Our theme for 2024 is simply one word, "SOULS". The mission and mandate of the church is to reach lost souls and see them become disciples of Jesus Christ.

In the parable of the lost coin (Luke 15), Jesus speaks of a woman who loses one of her ten silver coins. She diligently searches for it, sweeping the house and lighting a lamp until she finds the lost coin. When she finds the lost coin, she rejoices and calls her friends and neighbors to celebrate with her.

The point that Jesus was making is that lost SOULS are worth whatever it takes to reach them. Jesus did just that – He came "to seek and to save lost SOULS" (Luke 19:10), including you and me.

Supporting the work in Indonesia-Nabire

The brethren from Nabire seemed overjoyed to have visitation and expressed a desire to have further visits in the future.

Nabire can be accessed either through Jakarta or Bali. In both cases three flights are required – to Makassar in Sulawesi, then to Timika in southern Papua, then to Nabire. We left Jakarta at 10pm on Wednesday, travelled through the night and arrived in Nabire at 10am on Thursday.

On our arrival we were taken to see the new church building and have lunch. We were then taken to visit all the churches in Nabire, and to meet the Pastors, including one that was an hour and a half outside the city. There are 9 churches in Nabire, and 21 in Papua overall.

We were accompanied by the Indonesian Superintendent, Br Larry Khubani, and General Secretary, Br Thomson Manafe. Br Thomson did the interpreting for all the sessions.

On Friday, there was the dedication of the new Church building. This was a very big event, with over 1,000 people in attendance, including the Governor of Nabire. There were a number of special items and speakers, and I was asked to speak on behalf of the Australian church. The dedication service was followed by a lunch feast that the community was also able to attend. Later that day, we went to the Bible College and we answered a range of questions from the students.

On Saturday morning, a seminar was held for ministers and leaders, with good attendance. Br Caltabiano taught on Humility and Submission, and I taught on Integrity, the importance of Accountability and Transparency. Br Thomson also taught a session. That evening there was an evangelistic service with Br Caltabiano ministering. There was a very strong response to his ministry, with a number of people receiving the Holy Spirit.

On Sunday, a combined Church service was held, where I ministered. There was over 1500 in attendance. Following the service, we went to the ocean where we baptised 12 people in the name of Jesus. One of the people baptised was from a non-UPC group that had attended the service.

The Church in Nabire seems very strong. All of the churches have their own buildings, usually with the Pastor's residence attached. The largest church would be the original church pastored by Br Diaz, then the new one pastored by Br Alfie. They would certainly benefit from more visitation and teaching in the future. Please keep the work of God in this area in your prayers.

Ambon and Dobo







We continue to work in partnership in the Pacific region to support the establishment of Apostolic doctrine. Only 40% of the ministers in that district are baptised in Jesus Name. Many are part of the Indonesian UPC organisation, however, they are teaching trinitarians doctrines





In the last week of October, I was privileged to travel with Br Errol Paulus to Indonesia. We were invited to speak at a conference, accompanied by Br Larry Khubani, General Superintendent of GPSDI, and Br Thompson Manafe, the General Secretary.

Our first stop was Ambon where we ministered at a local church. Br Paulus preached a powerful message about the miraculous and God moved. Late last year, Br Paulus was given a word from God about Ambon and the island of Tual. In the vision, he was told that there 'awaited hungry souls'. He encouraged the local population to explore this open door in Tual.

From Ambon, we flew on a small plane to the island of Dobo where we taught leadership sessions to the local church leaders and ministers for 3 nights. This was a multi-denominational crusade hosted in an outdoor soccer stadium.

The island is remote and there was a feeling among the people that they were behind the rest of Indonesia. We assured them that God cared from them, and He had not left them behind.

There were wonderful moves of God throughout the crusade. On the Sunday following the crusade, we ministered at local churches around Dobo and we were able to pray for the congregations.

Jakarta

Early November Greg and I were privileged to go to Jakarta, Indonesia. While the initial plan was for both Greg and I to be together for the week, ministering at various churches, our schedules were re-arranged which saw Greg and a small team head to Dobo, a remote island of Indonesia, while I stayed in the city of Jakarta for the week.

It was a wonderful week in Jakarta – I was able to reconnect with so many that I had seen a few years prior when Greg and I were there back in 2014.

The first service I attended was a District Ladies Conference at Pr Wenas' church. Due to the distance for some of the church ladies, the conference was live streamed via Zoom. Praise God for technology! We had over 100 ladies join us in person and many more via live stream, from all over Indonesia. It was a powerful service!

On Friday, I was picked up at 6am, to speak at a scripture class. Br Amin and his church minister to the Christian Class, ages 6-12. I spoke about being full of faith and used a water bottle with the lid on or off as an example – it was a great visual tool to explain what it means to have God in you. The kids were absolutely adorable! I showed them pictures of my two little girls which

they loved!

While leaving this school, Br Amin received a call that we were being invited back to minister at another school but this time it was the older classes – year's 10 to 12! They hadn't had this opportunity in a number of months, so that was great news. I spoke about Gideon, and I used the example of an elastic band: without being stretched, it isn't used to its full potential. These young people were coming up on their final years of school and I challenged them to make their lives count for the sake of the Gospel! It was a great afternoon.

The following day, we taught some Music Sessions, spoke at a Ladies' Prayer Meeting and ministered on Sunday at the Mandarin service at JSS, and later at Br Kubani's Church on the other side of Jakarta. It was a powerful service!

God is moving throughout Indonesia – please continue to pray for strength for the Apostolic saints there. It is a nation where Christianity is the minority. We believe that God is continuing to open doors. Please continue to pray for the Pastors of the Apostolic churches – that God would bless and multiply every effort they make to further His kingdom in Indonesia.





What is a FAITH PROMISE?

What is a "Faith Promise"?

- ·It is a commitment to God to give a specific amount monthly or weekly.
- ·It is a spiritual covenant between the donor and God.
- · A pledge, which is based on the ability of the donor whereas Faith Promise is based on the ability of God to provide.
- ·Faith Promise is an agreement that, as God provides, the donor (the church) will give a specific amount monthly (or weekly) to the Overseas Missions Department.
- ·Faith Promise is a spiritual experience that requires faith in God.

Often our first reply to this assertion is "MY faith is so weak" or "I wish I had more faith"; and more often than not, we are only making excuses for not being totally committed to the cause of reaching a lost world.

Let's get the clear picture here that you do have "faith", be it great or small. I know this simply by what the Bible teaches, for example:

"Without faith it is impossible to please him" (God), and we all seek to please Him (Hebrews 11:6)

"To every man God hath given the measure of faith" (Romans 12:3)

"We walk by faith . . ." (1 Corinthians 5:7)

"The just shall live by faith" (Romans 1:17)



Faith Promise works because:

It is based upon a scriptural precedent.

It involves faith in God and personal commitment to the great commission.

It leads to consistent, individual involvement in missions.

It insures an increasing return.

Based upon the law of sowing and reaping, one can expect a harvest in proportion to his investment (Il Corinthians 9:6; Luke 6:38).

Faith Promise giving incorporates the dynamics of faith, love, commitment, consistency, and the sure promises of God. It cannot fail! It works!

A Faith Promise commitment should involve the three dimensions of giving:

Stewardship: giving from the wise use of material blessings the Lord has entrusted to you.

Sacrifice: giving that requires you to give up something in order to add a dimension of sacrifice to your giving.

Faith: giving that goes beyond your ability, and requires the exercise of faith in God to supply. (Heb 11:1, 6).

We supply the faith and God Will provide the promise.







Faith Promise giving supports the establishment of apostolic teaching across the Pacific, the building of churches, bible schools and evangelistic programs. It will always be about SOULS!




